From the Master, Commodore Patrick Tyrrell OBE Royal Navy



Summer has come at last, and the hedgerows are crowded out with colour and fragrance. The Livery year is passing fast and over the last month we held our fabulous Footwear Dinner at Girdlers' Hall and the Ascension Day service at our Livery Church, St Margaret Pattens. For those of you who have not yet had the opportunity to visit our Church, now is the time; it is the 300th anniversary of Sir Christopher Wren's death and the Church stands as a testament to his remarkable talents. It is also where the story of the Pattenmakers is laid out beautifully, showing how Pattens developed as well as examples of them.

May was, of course, a remarkable month with the coronation of King Charles III and all the associated pomp and pageantry. In conjunction with many of the Livery Companies we contributed towards the magnificent Anointing screen used in the most sacred part of the ceremony. After the Screen has been displayed as part of the Palace Summer Collection, the plan is to hold a reception for all of the Companies who donated with the screen present. This is likely to be held in Drapers' Hall in the autumn/winter – date to be confirmed, when those who did all the work will be asked to explain the part they played in creating the screen.

As your Master, Debbie and I had the great privilege of attending a Royal Garden Party just before the coronation. The sun shone and we enjoyed the gardens at their best. We even caught a glimpse of the King and Queen!



We also held a weekend away for members of the Court. The Cornish weather, for once, was magnificent and we enjoyed a river trip on the Fal and a visit to RNAS CULDROSE and our affiliated 824 Naval Air Squadron. We held a dinner in Falmouth and were entertained by a local choir, the Falmouth Shout, who entertained us with sea shanties, including “What shall we do with the drunken Pattenmaker!” We raised over £400 for the local RNLI.

As we look forward to the summer, we have the Election of the Sheriffs on 26th June, a Young Pattenmakers’ event on the Battersea Barge on the 29th June, and A Military Musical Spectacular on Horse Guards Parade on 6th July, details of all of which are in the newsletter.

**Livery Dinner at the Honourable Artillery Company
13th July 2023**



Our Summer Dinner is to be held in the grounds of the Honourable Artillery Company in City Road. The oldest unit in the British Army, the Company was established by Royal Charter by King Henry VIII in August 1537 to provide 'military exercise and training and for the better defence of the Realm'. The Company has occupied its current site since 1641. Their personnel are very familiar to the City, providing the Pikemen and Musketeers for the protection of the Lord Mayor and the gun crews to provide Royal Salutes as required.

The magnificent hall, where we will be dining, and the headquarters building dates from 1734. As well as dining in the splendour of the HAC Mess, and the five-acre grounds, we will have the services of one of our sponsored schools, The City Academy Islington, who will be providing a Guard of Honour from their school cadet force. It is one of very few CCFs associated with a State school. They will be under the supervision of Drum Major Mark Goatcher of the HAC. The detachment will be formed up by 1830 on the parade ground at the HAC before lining the stairs; I hope many of you can arrive slightly early to give them your full support.

We will be entertained by The Sixteen, a choral group, founded by Harry Christopher in 1979, who have gained international recognition and fame over the past 45 years. A co-founder of the group, Richard Price, will speak at the dinner about the history of the group and their philosophy of bringing medieval music to modern audiences. Their singing is sublime. I look forward to welcoming you all to a fantastic evening.

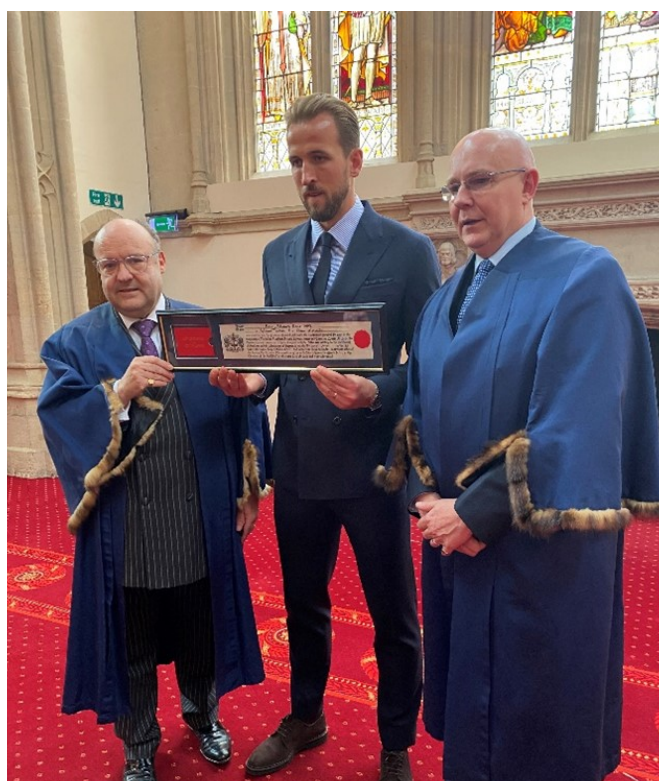
Freedom Ceremony Harry Kane MBE - The Upper Warden Deputy Keith Bottomley

As proud Pattenmakers, I was very happy to propose with Past Master Chris Hayward, Harry Kane for the Freedom of the City of London at Guildhall last month, in recognition of his outstanding sporting achievements.

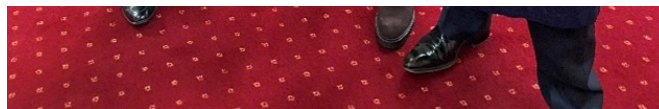
The 29-year-old from Walthamstow has enjoyed a remarkable career, starting in 2009 and aged just 16 when he was promoted to the senior team from Tottenham Hotspur's youth academy.

Picking up several major awards and accolades over the last decade, including PFA Young Player of the Year, three Premier League Golden Boots, the World Cup 2018 Golden Boot, and Premier League Playmaker of the Season, he was appointed MBE in 2019 for services to football. Harry is both Tottenham Hotspur's and England's all-time leading goal scorer, as well as being the second-highest Premier League all-time goal scorer.

Harry established the Harry Kane Foundation (HKF) in October 2022 with the aim of transforming generations' thinking about mental health. HFK uses Harry's time, profile and networks to work collaboratively with mental health experts, charities and strategic



mental health experts, charities and strategic partners to reach audiences of all ages through educational tools, tactical awareness campaigns and the provision of practical support.



HKF won an award at this year's Smiley Charity Film Awards, known as 'the Oscars for the charity sector' for the animation that it created to promote the importance of positive thinking, self-belief, and having the support of others.

I was delighted to support the nomination for Harry Kane's Freedom, which is richly deserved. Harry is, in every sense, at the top of his game and his Freedom goes some way towards expressing our admiration for his tremendous skill on the pitch, and our considerable pride in him.

One of the City of London's ancient traditions, the Freedom is believed to have begun in 1237 and enabled recipients to carry out their trade.

As well as being nominated for, or applying for, the Freedom, it is also offered by the City of London Corporation to individuals as a way of paying tribute to their outstanding contribution to London or public life, or to celebrate a very significant achievement.

Last year, it was announced that the entire England Women's Football Team will be awarded the Freedom of the City of London, following its 2-1 win over Germany in the European Championship Final at Wembley.

Recent high-profile recipients of the Freedom include former England cricketer, Sajid Mahmood; Nobel Prize-winning mathematical physicist, Professor Sir Roger Penrose; and singer-songwriter, Ed Sheeran.

City Livery Club 2023 Root & Branch Award – President Past Master Chris Hayward

As President of the City Livery Club, I am delighted to announce that the Panel constituted to judge the nominations for the Club's Root & Branch Award, this year ably chaired by Sheriff Andrew Marsden, have concluded their deliberations, and the result is as follows: The Winner of the 2023 Root & Branch Award is Michael Hockney MBE for his personal contribution to the success of the Lord Mayor's Big Curry Lunch. The Panel were extremely impressed by the results of the 2023 Big Curry Lunch, which raised £435,000, far exceeding previous years. It was clear that this was achieved, in no small part, by the determination of Michael as Co-Chairman to engage with a large number of Livery Companies, Ward Clubs, as well as City businesses, to sell a record number of places, and to secure a record number of donations and bids in its online auction. The idea of holding these curry lunches goes back to 2008, when Michael secured the support of the incoming Lord Mayor, Alderman Sir David Lewis, to draw the City's attention to the contribution made by the Armed Services and the ongoing needs of ex-service personnel and their families. The total raised since 2008 has been £3.3 million

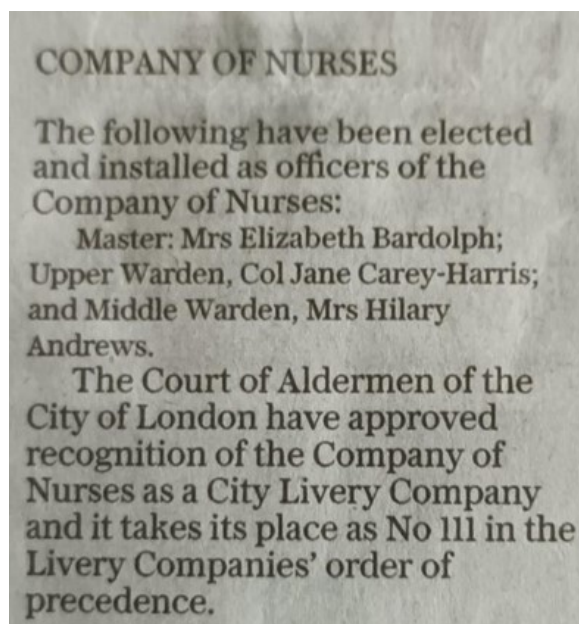

Sir David William Brewer, KG, CMG, CVO, JP, former Common Councillor then Alderman, Sheriff and Lord Mayor of the City, sadly passed away peacefully at Trinity Hospice on Sunday 23rd May, his 83rd Birthday.



Sir David served on both Courts from 1992 to 2010, representing the Ward of Bassishaw: firstly as a Common Councillor for 1992-1996, and thereafter as the Ward's Alderman. He served as Sheriff in 2002/2003 and as the City's 678th Lord Mayor in 2005/2006, roles which he carried out with great distinction. Sir David will also be known to many of you from his time as Lord-Lieutenant of Greater London from 2008-2015.

There will be a small private funeral. The date of any Thanksgiving Service will be notified.

News from St Paul's

There is a real feel of Summer finally having arrived, in recent weeks the Cathedral has been very busy with worshippers and visitors. I am delighted to report that we are now experiencing a very welcome return of tourists to the Cathedral with numbers considerably higher than this time last year. Although overall visitor footfall is still not yet back to the pre-Covid levels, it is better than our forecasts and this is very heartening.

Last month, we held Services to mark some special historic occasions and anniversaries, including a Thanksgiving Service for the Coronation of HM King Charles III on Sunday 7th May, which was attended by HRH the Duchess of Gloucester, the Lord Mayor and many City dignitaries. On the 9th May we hosted the 368th Clergy Support Trust Service at which we welcomed choirs from Llandaff and Leicester Cathedral to sing alongside us in a spectacular three choir event, this was followed by a special Thanksgiving Service on 10th May to mark the 900th Anniversary of St Bartholomew's Hospital and the Commemoration Service for Florence Nightingale on 16th May. Later this month, on 27th June, there will be a Wren 300 Thanksgiving Service to celebrate the life and work of Sir Christopher Wren. Tickets for the Service can be [booked here](#)

In this Wren 300 year, we have a special visitor Exhibition - 'Christopher Wren : The Quest for Knowledge,' located in the Cathedral Crypt, which explores and reflects on Wren's early life and career. It charts Wren's lesser-known achievements in mathematics, astronomy and physiology, as well as the design and building of his greatest monument - St Paul's Cathedral. Up in the Triforium of the Cathedral, the last stage in the conservation of the Wren Library has taken place with the return and reshelving of over 13,500 books and manuscripts. The restored historic Library can be seen in the photo below and is now once again open to the public. Meanwhile, work is progressing well on making the Whispering Gallery safe for visitors again and we hope to be able to reopen this popular tourist attraction later this year.



There is a considerable amount of activity going on with our Girls Voices Project, which will introduce Girl Choristers to the Cathedral Choir. Our plans for making infrastructure changes at the Cathedral School and the initial setup are all taking shape, we are moving ahead with the first stage of recruitment and will be opening up our Probationer Programme to girls from September 2023, although initially these will be day pupils. The fundraising campaign is well underway and we are looking to attract funders to help us realise our vision of forming the finest Cathedral Chorister Programme in the world.

Alongside this campaign, we also need to address some significant structural repairs to the fabric of the Cathedral and in particular our iconic Cupola which rises above the Cathedral Dome to grace the London skyline. We are at an early planning stage on the restoration works, which we envisage will provide a fascinating opportunity to engage the wider City community with our heritage. As always, our heartfelt thanks and appreciation for all that you do to support our work and strengthen our wider City community.

Every entry was of exceptional quality and the judges were quite hard pressed to decide which was the most deserving. In the end, the judges opted to divide the award equally between Hamza Cementwala for his light brown nu-buck trainer brogues for a man with severe bunions and rheumatoid arthritis, and Wunnai Tam for his black grain ankle boots for a woman with rheumatoid arthritis.

The quality of the closing on this black softie-grain, zip-up-the-back, laced ankle boots with a cushion collar was said by William Lobb to almost be worthy of his show window. That's not something I have heard about student work before.

Made for a woman with rheumatoid arthritis who wanted to be able to continue to walk her dog on wild terrains, these boots fulfilled the brief completely and were fit for purpose throughout.

The workmanship on this taupe suede trainer-style brogues was also very high.

Creating the illusion of narrowness by tapering the apparent parallel lines, made the foot look much slimmer than the client's wide foot, afflicted with large bunions actually was.

The stylish detailing, broguing and fine stitching made it a contender for the award that could not be put aside, even up against the black grain ankle boots.

The shoes and design portfolios were displayed and viewed by members and guests during the reception within the magnificent Court Room.

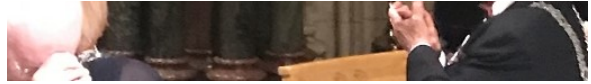

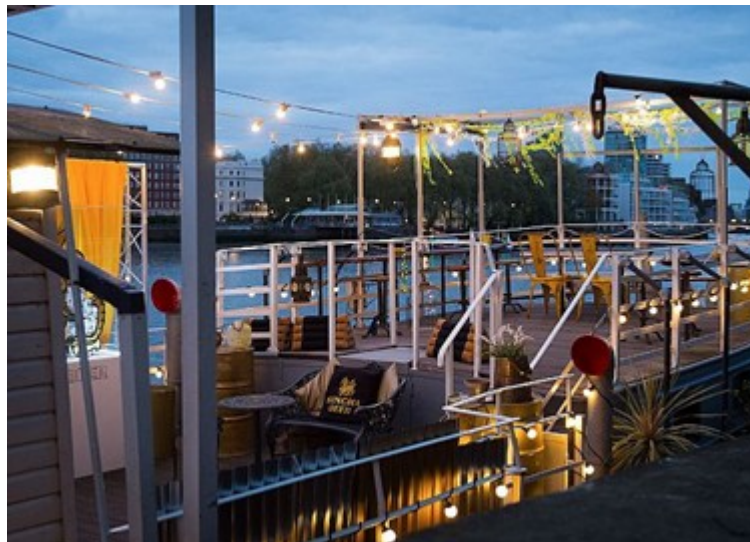
